A NEW CHAPTER FOR THE GLOSTER FANCY WORLDWIDE

The Annual General Meeting of the Gloster Fancy Canary Council International, held in Peterborough on Sunday, 13 September 2026, will be remembered as another significant milestone in the history of our Council.

Only seven months have passed since the Extraordinary General Meeting in February, when the decision was taken to transform the former GFCC-UK into a truly international organisation. At that time, we set ourselves an ambitious task: to bring Gloster enthusiasts from around the world together under a common vision, while preserving the traditions and heritage of this remarkable breed.

A Growing International Family

One of the most encouraging outcomes of the meeting was the

election of all the newly nominated Councillors, further expanding the international representation of the GFCCI.

Every new representative brings something valuable to our Council: experience, knowledge, enthusiasm and a deeper understanding of the Gloster Fancy within their own country.

The approval of all motions and proposals presented at the meeting also marked an important step forward. These decisions provide the Council with a foundation upon which to develop its activities, strengthen its international structure and provide greater support to clubs, breeders, exhibitors and judges.

But representation alone is not enough. The real value of an international Council lies in the active participation of its members.

I sincerely hope that every Councillor, whether newly elected or

already serving, will take an active role in communicating with their local clubs, sharing information and contributing ideas that will benefit the Gloster Fancy as a whole.

Preserving Our Heritage, Embracing the Future

Among the highlights of the AGM was the presentation of the historical development of the Gloster Standard of Excellence and the official unveiling of our new three-dimensional Gloster model.

This project represents a connection between generations. From the original Convention models to today's technology, the objective has remained the same: to provide breeders and judges with a clearer understanding of the ideal Gloster.

The new model is not intended to replace the written Standard. It is an educational reference designed to help fanciers study type, balance, proportion and overall Gloster character.

It was particularly satisfying to see this project finally presented to the Council, and I hope that it will become a valuable teaching tool at specialist shows, club meetings and judges' seminars throughout the world.

The development of our New Judges Framework, the Official User Manual for new Gloster clubs, and the GFCCI Recognised Clubs and Recommended Shows programmes further demonstrates our commitment to education and practical support.

These initiatives must now be translated into action.

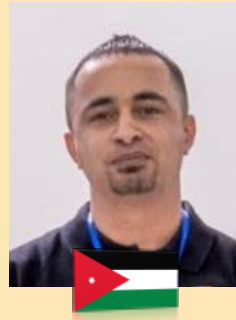

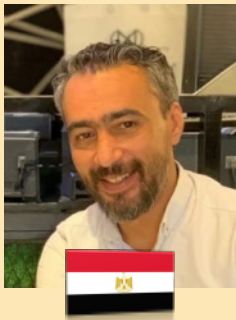
